Mainstreaming Gender into Integrated Drought Management



BACKGROUND

- Hazards, including drought, have diverse effects on individuals, families, and communities as a whole. Applying a gender perspective to all phases of disaster management is thus of utmost importance
- However, up to this date, gender knowledge and mainstreaming skills of stakeholders (e.g., government agencies, local authorities, technical specialists from civil protection to the emergency services, and local residents) remain limited.
- As a result, gender mainstreaming oftentimes falls short in disaster management, including in the specific sectors of Integrated Drought Management
- This issue has been already addressed (among others) with regard to Integrated Flood management.
